

TRAVELLER'S PALMS (Ravenala madagascariensis)

A couple of these unusual-looking trees in the vegetation seen from our hotel swimming pool. These are not true palm trees in the strictest botanical sense, but are from a related species. These trees have been given the name "traveller's palm" because the sheaths of the stems hold rainwater, which supposedly could be used as an emergency drinking supply for needy travellers. Another plausible reason for the name is that the fan tends to grow on an east-west line, providing a crude compass. The scientific name *Ravenala* comes from Malagasy *ravinala* or *ravina ala* meaning "forest leaves".












































CHAP GOH MEH

The 15th and last day of the Chinese New Year festival is Chap Goh Meh, or lantern festival day. In some Chinese communities, including those in Malaysia and especially Penang, the day is also regarded as the Chinese Valentine's Day. One of the day's traditions is for unmarried girls who are looking for a husband to throw mandarin oranges bearing their name and contact details into the sea or a river, in the hope that this will attract some lucky finder. The festival this year fell on 5 February. By 8 February, oranges could still be seen washed up on the beach and in the rocks.









SHORT-BANDED SAILOR BUTTERFLY (Phaedyma Collumella Singa)

Seen in our gardens today. It is about 6cm or 2½ inches across). Butterflies like these are becoming increasingly rare as a result of indiscriminate insecticidal "fogging". This fogging is aimed at control of mosquitoes and prevention of the spread of diseases that mosquitoes can pick up and transmit to humans (Dengue, Chicungunya, Zika, Malaria). The fogging, which is very visible and looks politically good is in fact the wrong solution for the mosquito-borne diseases problem. It also kills a lot of beneficial insect life such as butterflies.



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

QUEEN MARY 2 VISITS PENANG

The large luxury cruise ship, Queen Mary 2, operated by the US cruise company Carnival Cruises under its Cunard brand, is moored for a day at the Penang cruise terminal. The vessel carries up to 2,700 passengers, with 1,300 crew and entered service in 2004. This visit to Penang was part of a lengthy cruise from UK to Australasia and back. The vessel is diesel-electric powered: the screws are driven by electric motors; diesel generators provide the electric power for this and for all the housekeeping requirements on board and there are gas-turbine generators as back up for this. The vessel is faster and more streamlined than most other large cruise ships, with its design reflecting somewhat the family of "Queen" transatlantic ocean liners from which it has evolved.

















CRUISES TO NOWHERE

The Aegean Paradise, a 33 year old cruise liner (with a capacity of up to 650 passengers), with a long cruising history in Europe and Asia, now operates out of its home port Penang in a "retirement" role as a casino and entertainment vessel. It offers both daytime and nightime short cruises that travel outside the 12-mile limit and thus allow gambling and various duty-free privileges to be enjoyed. Thes trips are popularly called "cruises to nowhere". The photo shows the vessel returning to Penang early evening after the day-time cruise. Pulau Bidan, one of several very small islands just off the mainland coast of Malaysia here, which rises steeply to some 80m (270ft) above sea level, can be seen in the image some 20km beyond the vessel.

ASIAN WATER MONITOR LIZARD (Varanus Salvator)

A large monitor lizard seen in the water foraging among the rocks on the Penang shorefront. This one was about 2m long (including tail), but they can grow up to 2.5 to 3m long. The lizard has a long, prominently forked tongue, typically 30cm long, which serves as a sensory antenna (see further images of it on following page).





The Ketapang trees (Terminalia Catappa), known locally as sea almond trees, on account of their almond-like seed pods, are now entering one of their two brief annual leaf-shedding periods. The large leaves turn red at this point and leave the trees bare for a short time. These trees grow wild near the water around the coast of Penang, being tolerant to bright light, drought, salinity and windy conditions. The tree here is self-seeded and grows in the rocks of the sea-wall.






THE PRE-DAWN SWIM











































KL'S NEW MERDEKA 118 TOWER

The new government-owned tower will start receiving occupants during 2023. It is a typical mixed-development with several floors of shopping mall at the base, a wide range of office floors above and a 12-floor Park Hyatt-branded hotel and 5 floors of hotel residences at the top. 118 in the name reflects the number of floors. The top of the spire is 679m above ground (2,227ft), making it the highest building and structure in Malaysia and south-east Asia and the second tallest in the world – after Burj Khalifa (828m) in Dubai. There is a public observation deck at level 116. The minaret of the national Mosque can be seen in the foreground, just 0.2 km from the camera; the 118 Tower is 1km further away.


