




#### THE E&O'S PARASITIC NEEM TREE

The E&O's venerable so-called Java Tree (in background) has a Neem tree piggybacked on it. Neem (Azadirachta Indica) is native to India, member of the mahogany family, and source of a number of medicinal products. The Neem here, in turn, is host to a parasitic vine whose leaves almost cover it. The Neem's leaf crown is visible at top left.

The 'Java' tree here (Sterculia Fetida) is usually known as a Poon tree, whose name is probably derived from a corruption of 'pong' meaning bad smell. The Latin of the botanic name is indicative of bad smell; Sterculius was the Roman god of sewage; fetida is the Latin source word of fetid in English. The Poon tree's smell comes from its flowers when in blossom. The tree is found across a wide swathe of Asia from east Africa to Australasia. Other names for the tree include Skunk, Bastard Poon, Indian Almond, Java Olive. The usual name in German is amusing: gewöhnlicher Stinkbaum – or common stink tree. The E&O's name for the tree (Java Tree) is incorrect and is clearly a misplaced attempt to extract some regional heritage value from the 'Java Olive' name. The tree has nothing to do with the island of Java; 'Java Olive', like 'Indian Almond', is just another of the old traditional euphemisms for this stinky tree.




#### **COMMON TREE SHREW (Tupaia Glis)**

This small mammal, similar in size and shape to a squirrel, is native to Malaysia, Thailand and Indonesia. They live in cavities on the ground or in tree trunks and are considered generally carnivorous (worms, insects, larvae etc), rather than vegetarian — while squirrels are considered generally omnivorous, eating both animal and vegetable matter. Tree shrews are often seen foraging for food on the ground. They are not in fact classified zoologically as rodents (which are a class of small mammals with sharp front teeth used for gnawing or nibbling their food). Visually, tree shrews differ from squirrels in having less bushy tails and small flat ears, rather then ears that stand up.

#### THE GARAGE, FARQUHAR STREET, PENANG

This complex was built around 1913 in the centre of Georgetown, Penang, to provide service and repair for several makes of European motor vehicles that had begun to be imported here. After the 2nd World War and the Japanese occupation and until recently, the complex went through a variety of roles, housing retail, entertainment and catering outlets. It is now being substantially redeveloped – while still retaining its original art deco facades – as a mixed residential and retail development.

#### MISSION HOUSE AND CHAPEL, FARQUHAR STREET, PENANG

A couple of the restored buildings on this site across the street from the E&O Hotel. The site was developed in the 1870s to house a non-conformist protestant chapel and various associated buildings. These remaining buildings were restored around 2014, after reaching a very advanced state of decay and repurposed as a restaurant and events business. This seems to have failed and there appears to be no new role secured for the buildings yet. The buildings to each side – the Lim Mansions and the old Garage – are now being redeveloped but the major problem in any new role for buildings in this location is the access from a busy one-way street with fast, near-impossible traffic.









LIM LEAN TENG MANSIONS – RENOVATION UNDERWAY

Renovation of this striking art deco commercial building across the street from the E&O Hotel seems now to be underway. The building dates from the early 1900s – the period just before the 1st World War. From the start it was a commercial building, in spite of the 'mansions' in its name. It was built by a the businessman who was prominent at that time in importing and servicing European motor cars and who also established the 'The Garage' premises directly in front of the E&O. The 4 storey Lim building (often wrongly described as 3 storeys, due to the 4th story being largely invisible from the street) was set up with car showrooms on the ground floor along the street and offices above. The office floors were subsequently in the 1930s converted into residential accommodation for Europeans. The name 'Mansions' may first have been applied to the building at that time. During the 2nd World War the upper floors were taken over by the occupying Japanese – and left derelict after the War. The ground floor at street level saw a revival of use as car showrooms for a period after the war but eventually also fell vacant as car distributors took advantage of bigger and better sites available elsewhere. It is not known precisely what the new role of the building will be once the current (seemingly slow and drawn out) renovations are completed.

#### TRUE BIRD OF PARADISE FLOWER (STRELITZIA REGINAE)

Not to be confused with the false Bird of Paradise Flower (Heliconia) that is shown elsewhere in these pages and is found in many gardens in Penang. In the 'true' flower the flower petals are generally brilliant orange and there are some flashes of violet among them. They burst out of the side of the flower stem at a point just after the typical 30° bend in the stem and thus appear to be springing out of the top of the head of the 'bird'. These features – especially the curve in the stem – help to distinguish the true from the false flower.

This is a tropical flower with a fascinating mix of English, German and South African connections. The flower's nickname, Bird of Paradise, is said to derive from its spectacular appearance, which can be likened to the showy plumage of the various tropical forest birds known as birds of paradise. It is also in South Africa known as Crane flower, because of a perceived similarity to a crane bird's head. Few people know the background to the flower's nomenclature, as described below.

The flower, of which there are numerous varieties and colours, is indigenous to South Africa – although it is now cultivated widely in tropical climates worldwide. It appears to have been "discovered" and first formally named in 1788 by Joseph Banks (1743-1820), the eminent English botanist and naturalist. Banks, educated in the natural sciences at Harrow, Eton and Christ Church Oxford, was independently very wealthy and this allowed him to travel widely around the world on his various missions of botanical discovery. He took part in the first epic voyage of Captain James Cook around the world in HMS Endeavour, 1768-1771.

The flower was first brought to England and cultivated in the botanic gardens at Kew, near London, in 1773. It was formally classified and named by Banks in 1788. Banks had a long association with these botanic gardens and was closely involved in securing continuing support for them from the King and Royal Family. The Kew site dates back at least to the mid 1750s and has its origins in the much older royal estates surrounding the nearby royal palaces of Kew and Richmond.

Joseph Banks, in formally classifying and naming the flower in 1788, took the politically wise step of naming it after the Queen of England at the time, thus ensuring continuing royal support for the Kew gardens' research and other botanic activities. Charlotte, a German princess of the Duchy of Mecklenburg-Strelitz<sup>1</sup>, had become Queen Charlotte after marrying England's King George III in 1761 when she was 17 and shortly after George had become King in 1760 at the age of 22. The flower's official name chosen by Banks was *Strelitzia Reginae*, commemorating both Strelitz, the place of the Queen's ancestry in Germany, and the Queen herself by the use of *Reginae* (=of the Queen).

The Strelitzia Reginae flower grows from a clump root (a rhizome), like the ginger plant. It can be propogated from the root or from its seeds. In respect of its seeds, it is one of the very few flowers that requires pollination by birds, rather than insects. Technically, a pollinating bird sits on one of the petals as it feeds on nectar contained in part of the flower; the bird's weight then triggers a pollen sac to open and

disperse the pollen, with the bird then unknowingly carrying the pollen to the pollen-receiving part of the flower.

Following her early marriage to Englnd's King George III in 1761, Charlotte of Strelitz had 15 children. These and their descendants added generously to the pool of members of the intertwined German-Danish royal families who occupied most of the inherited "royal" positions across north Europe at that time. In 1883, some 120 years after Charlotte's own marriage, and many descendants further on, two of Charlotte's descendants married and subsequently became King George V and Queen Mary. George (son of Edward VII and grandson of Queen Victoria) was Charlotte's great-great grandson; his bride was the German Princess Mary of Teck, Charlotte's great-granddaughter. This is a good example of the intermarriage between cousins from this extended European royal family network that was prevalent at that time.









A close-up shot of the clock at the top of the 150 foot tower of the old Federated Malay States Railway headquarters building in the angle of Gat Lebuh China and Weld Quay. The building, in Edwardian baroque style, was completed in 1907. The clock is no longer in service, but the 2-ton bell that used to sound the hours is visible, with its striker, through the window. Railway passengers could buy tickets here but had to take a steamer from the adjacent pier across to the mainland to actually join a train. This was the tallest building in Penang until the second half of the 1900s and was a prominent feature of Penang's waterfront for all visitor arriving by ferry from thr mainland.















### **VIEW ACROSS THE CHANNEL**

The classic view from the E&O Hotel – across the North Channel to the mainland and the massif of Kedah Peak, 1,217 m or 3,993 ft high. The mountain lies 40 km away and the shore of the mainland in front of it is 12 km away at this point.


### **CHRISTMAS TREE**

#### **HELICONIA BIHAI FOWERS**

The Heliconia is also known as the red water heliconia, probably due to the way that the boat-shaped flower sheaths or flower bracts often hold water. The actual flowers in fact are quite insignificant, concealed inside the flower bracts.
