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#### **COMMERCIAL FISHING BOAT**

Another uncommon sighting of a commercial fishing boat, heading into Penang port for some reason. The registration, PKF A9702, shows it to be from Perak (PK), the next state southwards, with the F after PK confirming it as a commercial fishing boat. The wheelhouse/superstructure on these larger fishing boats (which in this photo looks improbably top-heavy) must be painted in the identification colour of the registration state – in this case yellow for Perak.





#### **MV MARELLA DISCOVERY 2**


One of the cruise ships of the cruises arm of German travel group TUI, seen arriving early morning and leaving early evening, with a brief daytime stopover in Penang. This one is based in Singapore, providing 1-2 weeks cruises around the SE Asia region and is an occasional visitor to Penang. With 1,800 passenger capacity, it is not quite as large as the typical 2,500 capacity vessel that we generally see here. This one is also adults-only, reflecting a growing trend in the hospitality and tourist industry to provide customers with the option to enjoy services without the distraction of children and child-oriented activities.





#### **MV MEIN SCHIFF 5**

The German TUI travel group's Mein Schiff 5 emerges from behind our building on an evening departure to Singapore. It has passenger capacity of up to 2,500.

#### FRANGIPANI TREE IN BLOSSOM (Plumeria Rubra)

Native originally to tropical central America, this small shrub-like flowering tree was introduced by the Spanish colonists into the Philippines in the 1500s, from where it has spread all over tropical SE Asia. It has migrated similarly to most other tropical parts of the world. While best known for its versions with white flower and yellow centre, it is now found with a wide range of sub-varieties in colours and mixtures of white, red, pink, yellow and brown that have resulted from extensive cross-propagation. Although the shrubs drop leaves at a certain point in the annual cycle, they flower almost continuously throughout the year. The prime characteristic of the flower is perhaps its strong fragrance: sweet and opulent, with a hint of almond. The shrub acquired the common name of Frangipani, after an Italian family of perfumiers with this name who developed a perfume that matched the Plumeria fragrance in the 1500s.

#### **RAMADAN DECOR**

It is nice to see here and there some tasteful decoration for the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan, that begins tomorrow. This is in contrast to the increasingly ugly and overdone décor for the festivals of Christmas/New Year and Chinese New Year that we have enjoyed in the last two months. Green is a colour typically associated with Ramadan. The card at the top of the décor in the photo means "happy Ramadan". The green baskets in this display (inside a hotel's restaurant arcade) probably represent fish traps, used to capture fish in the waters of flooded rice fields – but they may also represent another food symbol, the cage that is used to hold live chickens in local markets.



#### MS AMBIENCE OF AMBASSADOR CRUISES


The Ambience cruise ship of Ambassador Cruises makes a late afternoon departure from Penang, on a 120 day round the-world cruise, heading for East and South Africa, South America and then return its home port of Tilbury, UK. This is a small start-up UK cruise operator with two vessels at present and that operates out of UK ports. It focuses on the over-50s and only a few of its summer cruises accept children. The Ambience is a relatively old vessel (1991) that has gone through multiple changes of ownership and several substantial modernisations. It carries up to 1400 passengers.





#### **SUNRISE**

The sun has risen a few minutes ago and is now just visible behind one of the other towers of our apartment complex.



#### **LOKE MANSION – A PENANG HERITAGE BUILDING**

This is a 100 year old heritage building that was originally right on the sea front (this is a view from the land side). It was built in 1924-5 in the English "Arts and Crafts" architectural style and was the residence of a wealthy Chinese business family. The family had Scottish connections and these are remembered in the decorative iron gates (next page).

#### A COLONIAL-ERA BUNGALOW

This is one of several other old colonial-era residences close to the Loke Mansion. This one is typical of the Indian/Burmese style of the 1920s found quite widely in Penang. The front entrance is usually protected by a port cochère with decorative plasterwork. These detached residences of two (sometimes three) storeys have always been known as "bungalows", which locally means a substantial, multi-storey, free standing house – and not the basic, no-frills, small, single-storey house that the word identifies in England.









#### **CARGO BUSINESS**


In contrast to the various large passenger vessels that call at Penang, there is a steady stream of small-to-medium cargo vessels that call here, connecting with ports all around south-east Asia. This one is a small container ship, equipped with on-board cranes for loading and unloading of containers in ports that are not equipped with specialist container gantry cranes. Navios is a large US-based shipping operator specialised in movement of bulk dry cargo. It was originally a wholly-owned subsidiary of US Steel, transporting iron ore from south America to USA.



#### **SEVEN SEAS MARINER CRUISE SHIP ARRIVES**

On a hazy morning the cruise ship Seven Seas Mariner, of Regent Cruises, arrives off Penang among the various in-shore fishing boats that are at work today in this area. The vessel has just taken on the pilot for the last stretch of the journey into the port and the pilot boat can be seen leaving at speed just in front of the Mariner's bow.











The vessel is homeward bound on a 123-day cruise that started on 3 Jan with an itinerary of New York, Southampton, South Africa, Australia, SE Asia, Middle East, Suez, Mediterranean, Southampton, New York arriving 5 May. The QM2 carries up to 2,600 passengers. Cunard is now a wholly owned subsidiary of the US cruise group Carnival Corp (as are a number of other well-known cruise brands) but the Cunard branding and colour scheme is preserved





#### YEOH KONGSI COMPLEX, PENANG

A view into the courtyard of the Yeoh Kongsi complex in Penang, showing some interesting wrought iron décor on a first floor balcony. The inscription on the facade tells us that these buildings were erected in 1929. The Kongsi are Chinese Hokkien clan associations, open to those of the same background and bearing the same family name (in this case Yeoh) and they date from the mid-1800s when various groups of Hokkien Chinese migrated to Penang. There are five surviving such Kongsi in Penang; this one dates from 1836. The other four Kongsi are: Cheah, Khoo, Lim and Tan.






#### **OLD MALAYAN RAILWAYS BUILDING**

This 1907 building was originally the Penang headquarters of Malayan Railways and in the centre of its facade can be seen the imprint: 1907 M.R. The railway lines, right up to today, terminated across the strait and never extended from the mainland over to Penang Island. It was always necessary to take a ferry from Penang Island to reach the railhead at Butterworth on the mainland – until 1985 when the first bridge was opened and it became possible to reach the railhead by road. Early on, the building was taken over and used as its local headquarters by the Malaysian Customs Department. It now seems that some restoration work is starting on this historic structure, which has lain deserted for some time. See additional information on the building under the note of 16 November 2023.

#### **RESTORED OFFICE BUILDINGS**

The end of this street is marked by a pair of near-identical old Chinese Art Deco buildings, dating from about 1937. The one on the left, carrying the name Bangunan (= building) U. A. B., was originally a bank building housing the India Overseas Bank and later the United Asia Bank (hence the U.A.B. in the building name). Subsequent more recent office tenants have included Kazanah Nasional (Malaysian National Wealth Fund – a government controlled investment fund) and Think City, one of the organisations planning and coordinating heritage restoration activity in Georgetown. The building on the right carries the name Bangunan Wawasan, a fairly recent name, identifying the fact that it is now operated as part of the Wawasan Open University campus in Penang, set up in 2008 to provide distance learning for Malaysians unable to enter tertiatry education through conventional cannel Wawasan in Malay in this context means vision.







While independent shoe shops and chains of specialist shoe shops have long disappeared from Penang, the top local department store still has a large shoe department that carries a wide variety of shoe brands.



#### **MALAY LANGUAGE**

This notice illustrates a couple of the surprising features of the Malay language as found today in Malaysia.

One: many modern words in the language have been borrowed from English but have had their original English spelling adjusted/simplified to reflect local perceptions of how the English word is spoken. "Pam" is the modern Malay word for "pump"; its spelling reflects how it is perceived to be spoken. My list of these borrowed English words with their modified spellings can be seen in the same folder as these photo notes.

<u>Two</u>: a number of Malay words mean something quite different from what they would seem to mean in English. "Air "in Malay means "water" (coming from an old proto-Austronesian word-form with this meaning). At petrol filling stations here you will see signs referring to "Air" and "Angin". These mean "water" and "air", not what they appear to mean at first sight.

The Malay words on the notice correspond to: ROOM PUMP POOL WATER









This staircase, in the Gurney Plaza shopping mall, always strikes us as a perfect example of Penang's building style in commercial premises in the late 80s/early 90s: metal railings painted green or grey-green; suggestions of Italian styling; varnished natural wood handrail on top. We often use this staircase for exercise (instead of the lift) to come up from the underground car park.
